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
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
Simon K. Haslett

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
ROBERT RECORDE Tudor Scholar and Mathematician

This enthralling biography tells for the first time the complete and chronological story of one of Tudor England's most enigmatic figures, Robert Recorde (c.1512–58), a Tudor scholar and Renaissance scientist. During his lifetime, his reputation for learning was second to none; he was a teacher, an accomplished mathematician and, in dangerous times, a cautious champion of the Protestant Reformation. His life story is one of great triumphs and, ultimately, of personal tragedy.

Gordon Roberts is an independent scholar; by profession an aircraft engineer, he is widely read in the sciences, technology, mathematics and engineering.

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This book is about the locations Shakespeare used for his plays. Some he was personally familiar with, like Windsor; some he grasped

imaginatively, like Kronborg Castle ('Elsinore'); some, like Hampton Court and the Middle Temple, hosted Shakespearean performances. These locations shaped Shakespeare's dramas, and this study offers opportunity to see the plays through Shakespeare's own eyes.

Ralph Berry is a Shakespeare and Renaissance drama expert, writer and reviewer. He has held the position of Professor of English at the Universities of Ottawa, Manitoba and York University, Toronto.

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
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
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John Rutherford

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
Trefor M. Owen, Revised by Emma Lile

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

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


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
Diarmait Mac Giolla Chriost

This is the first book on the office of the Welsh Language Commissioner. The author draws upon a rich variety of source material arising from fieldwork conducted in a number of jurisdictions, including a series of

documents obtained under Freedom of Information applications, in-depth interviews with key actors from pertinent legislatures, governments, regulatory offices, interest groups and civic society. The work is multi-disciplinary in approach, engaging with language policy and planning, sociolegal studies and the politics of language.

Diarmait Mac Giolla Chriost is Professor at the School of Welsh, Cardiff University, where he is also a leading member of the school's research unit on language, policy and planning.

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These volumes show The Prince of Wales as his ideas, knowledge and experience develop, from his first speech at the age of twenty in 1968 to his more recent speeches in 2012. What is most noteworthy, however, is that though the style of the speeches and articles have changed over the years, the overall message has remained consistent – not only in terms of environmental degradation and climate change, but also in matters relating to healthcare, urban form, organic farming and the need for greater respect and understanding between religions – all of which speak volumes for The Prince's passion for and commitment to what he believes, even in times when his ideas have been unconventional.


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
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
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
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
