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
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
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LOCATING LYNETTE ROBERTS

'ALWAYS OBSERVANT AND SLIGHTLY OBSCURE'

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

Each essay strives in some way to 'place' Roberts; analysing the multiple environments to which her writing responds, key concerns are highlighted in her elusive, haunting work, defining its contribution to twentieth-century literary culture.

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

WOVEN PALMS

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

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
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
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WOMEN AND THE CITY IN FRENCH LITERATURE AND CULTURE

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

Gillian Ni Cheallaigh is a former Lecturer in French and Francophone Women's Writing at King's College London, and currently an independent researcher.

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
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
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

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
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
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Series: Rethinking the History of Wales



Jen Wilson is a jazz pianist and founder of Jazz Heritage Wales, based at UWTSD Swansea.


