



During the early twentieth century, the Welsh chapels found their social position and self-understanding challenged by the nascent labour movement and by socialist agitation. The Nonconformist response was to move away from political involvement and to develop a separate approach to the social questions of the day. This book discusses Nonconformist thinking and socio-political engagement in early twentieth-century Wales. It traces the emergence of a 'social gospel', its main protagonists and its eclipse by the outbreak of the Second World War. This new edition of *Building Jerusalem* will appeal to a new generation of scholars and readers interested in Wales's Nonconformist history, presenting an exploration of Welsh social thinking, politics and religion.

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Joseph Crawford lectures in English Literature at the University of Exeter. His previous research has focused on the history of Gothic literature.

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
